### Incident Reporting: How to Best Reach the SFPD

Here is some useful information for our Central residents about reporting crimes and obtaining police services. If you are reporting a crime that is *in progress*, dial 9-1-1 immediately. Also, call 9-1-1 to report fires, medical emergencies and any emergencies related to public safety.

To report a non-emergency incident (a crime that has already occurred and the suspects are gone) please call the SFPD non-emergency phone number at 415-553-0123 to have an Officer dispatched to meet with you.

You may also go to any SFPD district station to make a report. Central Station is located at: 766 Vallejo Street.

For your convenience, the following crimes may be reported on-line using the SFPD's main website (<http://sanfranciscopolice.org/REPORTS>):

- Harassing Phone Calls: When you are experiencing annoying calls - with no known suspects; for example, hang-ups or heavy breathing.

- **Lost Property:** When property has disappeared and not stolen. If you think it could have been taken but you have no idea by who, you may enter the report online.
- **Theft:** When property is stolen but there has been no illegal entry or contact by the thief.
- **Vandalism/Graffiti:** The act of changing, modifying or defacing public or private property, including graffiti.
- **Vehicle Burglary:** When property was stolen from a vehicle.
- **Vehicle Tampering:** Tampering with a motor vehicle, including vandalism/graffiti of the vehicle.

When you call 9-1-1 or the SFPD non-emergency number, you are actually calling the Department of Emergency Management (DEM) and a trained professional will prioritize your call and send you the closest and most appropriate resource(s). Important data and tracking information will also be captured to assist in getting help to you in the most efficient manner.

Please note, the Central District Police Station email account is NOT monitored daily and was not set up to take reports of criminal incidents or suspicious occurrences.

Additionally, although we post information on social media such as "Nextdoor" and "Twitter" for informational purposes, the Police Department does not and cannot view your neighborhood "Nextdoor" posts and chats, because of privacy concerns. Please encourage your "Nextdoor" contacts to report incidents to the Police when they post information regarding crimes and any public safety issues on "Nextdoor".

If you are concerned about a homeless person in San Francisco, call 3-1-1 to make a report. The 3-1-1 staff will talk with you to determine if the call is referred to the San Francisco Homeless Outreach Team (SF HOT) or other emergency response services. # Featured Officer of the Month

## Sergeant Rosemarie Smith

*Each month Central Police Station features one of its officers in an effort to learn more about the men and women who police our neighborhood. This month, we interviewed Sergeant Rosemarie Smith, a 7-year member of Central Police Station.*

Sergeant Smith was born in San Francisco, CA. She graduated from Lowell High School. She is currently attending classes at the San Francisco Academy of Art. She will be graduating this year with a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts.

Sergeant Smith joined the San Francisco Police Department on June 26, 1995. After graduating from the Police Academy, she was assigned to Mission Station for field training. After field training, she was assigned to Richmond Station for her probation station. After probation, she remained at Richmond Station by the request of the Captain. At Richmond Station, she was assigned as the Traffic Car Officer because of her skill at drawing accident diagrams. As an Officer, Sergeant Smith had also worked at Taraval and Northern Stations.

Sergeant Smith was promoted to Sergeant in 2009. After waiting for 16 years to transfer to Central, she took her transfer to Central Station in August 2011. Upon arriving at Central Station, she was a Sergeant in the Station Investigation Team. She is now a Patrol Sergeant and can be seen in the Fisherman's Wharf area. As a Sergeant, she had also worked at Tenderloin, Ingleside, Technology Division and Financial Crimes Unit. Her specialty is in Fraud since she has worked in the Financial Crimes Unit as well as working in banking as a Customer Service Manager before becoming a police officer.

Sergeant Smith works the swing shift by choice in order to continue her education at the Academy of Art during the day. In art, she specializes in Portraiture and Figure painting, but she can also paint landscapes. She also likes sculpture and printmaking. Her most painted model is her 5 year old granddaughter, Zoe, who asked for a whistle for Christmas so she can also be a policewoman.

Sergeant Smith's favorite thing about the Central is working with her co-workers and walking and talking to people in the neighborhood and visiting customers at the local coffee shops and restaurants.

**Robbery** – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

12/28	10:00pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>1300 BLK of Washington</b>	Two unknown suspect pushed the victim to the ground. One of the suspects pinned the victim to the ground while the other suspect stole her bags. The suspects then fled the scene in a vehicle.
12/30	6:50pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>200 BLK of Post</b>	An unknown suspect entered the store and stole a jacket. The suspect was confronted by an employee at the exit. The suspect pushed past the employee and fled the scene.

One of the suspects had his hand inside of his sweatshirt and threatened to shoot the victim if he did not give them his property. Fearing for his safety, the victim gave the suspects his wallet. The suspect attempted to leave and then began to fight with security. Security was able to detain him and recovered a pistol on the ground during the struggle. <b>Arrest made.</b>
1/2	1:00pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>600 BLK of Market</b>	An unknown suspect entered the store and an employee recognized him from previous incidents. The employee showed another employee a picture of the suspect and the suspect threatened to hit them. The suspect grabbed merchandise and fled the scene.
1/2	10:55pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Gun</b> <b>100 BLK of Powell</b>	The victim was counting the store's cash deposits in the security room when an unknown suspect knocked on the door. The victim opened the door and the suspect walked in and pointed a firearm at him. The suspect took money and fled the scene.
1/4	10:00pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Jones/Post</b>	Two unknown suspects punched the victim in the back of the head and stole his backpack.
1/5	11:00am	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>100 BLK of Geary</b>	Two unknown suspects entered the store and stole merchandise. An employee attempted to block the door, but the suspects pushed her away from the door and fled the scene.

The suspect saw the Officers and fled. The rest of the group stated that the suspect had just robbed a victim of her cell phone. The Officers chased the suspect and detained him. <b>Arrest made.</b>
1/7	10:20am	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>100 BLK of Jackson</b>	The suspect entered the store and stole a bottle of alcohol. The suspect was confronted by security, but the suspect fled. Security chased the suspect. The suspect threw the bottle of alcohol on the sidewalk and picked up a piece of glass. The suspect slashed at the security and cut his hand. The suspect fled onto BART where he was detained. <b>Arrest made.</b>

The suspects went through the victim's pockets and stole property. The suspects fled onto a MUNI bus. Officers boarded the bus and found the suspects matching the description provided. The victim positively identified them as the suspects who stole from him. <b>Arrest made.</b>
1/9	1:30am	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>1200 BLK of Sacramento</b>	An unknown suspect approached the victim from behind and punched him in the head. The victim dropped his cell phone when punched. The suspect picked up the cell phone and fled the scene.
1/10	12:01am	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Bush/Powell</b>	An unknown suspect struck the victim in the face and stole his cell phone and money.
1/10	7:10pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Other Weapon</b> <b>100 BLK of Powell</b>	A group of unknown suspects entered the store and stole merchandise. Employees tried to stop the suspects at the door, but the suspects pepper sprayed them in the face and fled the scene.
1/11	6:10pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Other Weapon</b> <b>600 BLK of Market</b>	Three unknown suspects entered the store and stole speakers. The suspects fled and an employee followed them out of the store. The suspects were throwing glass bottles and rocks at the glass door and one of the objects struck the employee in the head. Security followed the suspect to the bus stop where he was detained by Officers. <b>Arrest made.</b>







### **Burglary, Vehicle**

1/14 1443 hrs  
400 BLK of Francisco


Central Station uniformed officers responded to an auto boost in progress. Officers detained a male located in the front passenger seat of a vehicle with a broken window. Officers made contact with a witness who had taken pictures of the suspect as he broke into the vehicle. A metal bar believed to be used to break the window of the vehicle was recovered. A computer query revealed the suspect to be on parole for burglary. The suspect was booked into county jail.

### **Burglary, Apartment House, Unlawful Entry**

1/14 2150 hrs  
1000 BLK of Kearny

Uniformed Officers responded to reports of a person breaking into an apartment building. Officers made contact with two victims who were woken by a suspect breaking into the lobby area of the apartment building. The victims also told officers about recent mail thefts in the building and they provided officers with a partial license plate and vehicle description of the suspect's vehicle. Officers located the vehicle a short time later and detained the driver. Officers recognized the suspect from crime bulletins for thefts in the area. She was transported to Central Station for further investigation. The officers towed the suspect's vehicle for driving with a suspended license. During an inventory search of the vehicle, several pieces of stolen property, as well as items linking the suspect to prior thefts were recovered. The suspect was mirandized and interviewed regarding the thefts. The suspect admitted to the prior thefts as well as approximately 100 similar incidents. The suspect was booked into County Jail.

## Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

## Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Central Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Central Station have beat officers assigned to Union Square, Fisherman's Wharf, Chinatown, North Beach and Market/Drumm area.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Central Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.

## Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



## What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

### Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.


